Greetings!

October is here! Creation is changing colors! The trees are becoming brilliant red, yellow and gold. Pumpkins adorning porches and apples are ready to be dipped in caramel. As much as I enjoy and appreciate the beauty of the colors, the scent of Fall is an aroma that fills my spirit as much as my nostrils. For me there is just something amazing about Autumn. Maybe it is because the beautiful changes in creation lead to rest and rejuvenation. As the leaves fall and that grass is less green, it rests, preparing to amaze us once again with its beauty as it comes to life in the Spring.

I think for some of us Autumn feels like it's the time of year when things start to slow down. I have been reading my great-grandfather's diaries and it seems when October/early November begin, he writes a lot less. From plowing, dragging, and planting to having, thrashing, and cutting corn to cutting wood and catching up on repairing harnesses. It was certainly a slower time in 1896. We lead such busy lives in the twenty-first century...winter does not slow us down! Work, school activities, extra-circular events, appointments and a snow storm may cause schools to declare a snow day, but it doesn't stop us from getting out and going to work, going shopping, going to the movies. I hear people say they don't have enough time to get caught up! Makes you wonder when they take the opportunity to rest and rejuvenate.

The Psalmist writes, "I lift my eyes to the hills—from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber. He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor **sleep"** (Psalm 121:2-4). God my not need to sleep and rejuvenate, but God knows that humans do. God especially wants his human creations to not just rest, but to rest in him...abide in him... spend time with him...quiet time...time when we are in conversation with our Creator. These conversation are not just us talking, we need to spend more time listening for the still small voice of God. It is in these moments of resting and listening that God rejuvenates us, sparks our spirits, energizes our bodies to do the work he calls us to do!

Peter writes, "But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:8-9). God works in God's time (Kairos time), not human time (Chronos time). And as God works, he asks us to rest, abide in him. What wondrous things come to us when we do.

So take some time during these months of Autumn to slow down, rest, spend time with God. Pray, listen and wait upon the Lord. God will not ignore you. God will speak in ways that will excite you, refresh your spirit and compel you to share what God has done for you.

They also participate in professional development and additional training and coaching to improve their quality. - -Staff continuously take trainings and are educated in child development or early childhood.
- -A safe, healthy environment for the children to learn and explore.
- -Providers track children's growth and development and help them learn and reach developmental milestones.
- -Caring relationships with children and families.
- -Have strong family involvement in their program.
- -Children have a wide variety of hands-on learning opportunities and materials.
- -Staffing is consistent.
- -Programs are inclusive. They support family cultures, recognize family diversity, use of home language and ensure that all children have an equal opportunity to succeed.
- -NACC is currently going through our evaluation process with Great Start to Quality. We strive to be the best!
